



- *Manually sign ALL Temple checks
- *Attend ALL Divan meetings
- *Report on financial matters at Temple business meetings



MOSLEM SHRINERS 2018 SPRING CEREMONIAL CLASS HONOREE - NOBLE GREGG KNIGHT

When you ask a Past Potentate what was one of the most memorable highlights of the year they served Moslem Shriners as the Potentate, unequivocally, the answer is recognizing a well-deserved Noble as the Class Honoree of a Ceremonial. I believe that this is one of the most rewarding decisions, not only does the nobility get to congratulate one of their own for the dedication they have showed our fraternity and philanthropy, but also, the incoming Nobles of that class have an opportunity to meet and bond with a Noble that truly exemplifies the nature of a Shriner.

I am proud to announce that the 2018 Spring Ceremonial Class Honoree is Noble Gregg Knight. This year marks Greggs' 35th year as a member of Moslem Shriners, and he has been an active member, in various capacities since day one.

Gregg was born in Wyandotte, MI on June 28, 1945. He grew up in Allen Park, graduating high school in 1963. Four weeks after he turned eighteen, he began working for Ford Motor Company, a company he would retire with on January 1, 1998, from the Rawsonville Parts Manufacturing Plant. He began in assembly, working his way up to supervisor at the age of 21, maintenance supervisor in 1975, and serving in management of maintenance beginning in 1985. I think that Gregg's attitude towards life may be best exemplified as "Ford Tough".

Gregg is one of six children (four sisters and two brothers). He was married in 1965 and raised two boys; Gregg Jr. and Timothy (deceased at the age of 33). Gregg Jr. lives in California. In 1986 Gregg married his beautiful wife Paula, and the combined household includes Paula's children; David Wickens, Kim Engels, and Scott Wickens (deceased 2017). Gregg and Paula have been gifted with nine grandchildren; Scott Jr. Brock, Lance, Nichols, Olivia, Savannah, Angellina, Sophia and Jackson. Gregg and Paula built their forever home in South Lyon in 2001, and have been gracious hosts to innumerable Shrine events. They love to vacation, and every other year spend time on the exotic island of Kauai, Hawaii.

As a Ford employee, Gregg was approached by Brother Jack Riggs, who eventually sponsored Gregg's raising as a Master Mason in Phoenix Lodge No. 13 F. & A. M., in Ypsilanti, Michigan, in 1983. The fall of 1983 saw Gregg cross the hot sands in becoming a Noble of Moslem Shriners. He immediately joined Rawsonville Shrine Club, along with many co-workers from Ford. He eventually became President of Rawsonville in 1987, at which point the club had 110 active members. For many years, the Nobles of the R.S.C. were the backbone of the volunteers that made the Ann Arbor Satellite Shrine Circus a huge success. Gregg is very proud of the fact that in the 1980's, R.S.C. had over 90% of its members at the general elections of Moslem Shriners annually.


During this time he was asked to join the Hungry Five, and has been actively involved in all their activities to this day.

In 2007, Gregg joined the Americans, a Unit he loves and devotes much of his time, especially ensuring the coldest camel's milk is available to any son of the desert.

In 2010, Gregg was asked to become the Chief Aide of Moslem Shriners. As with any other position he chose to serve, Gregg set the standard in the manner in which the Chief Aide should respond to his "job". Several Potentates since, have asked Gregg to serve as the Chief Aide, and Gregg takes pride that at any given time, when a Potentate has asked for a specific event be staffed, whether it be at the temple, Potes' Ball, or at an Imperial Convention, he would be the first one to start things off, and the last one to leave. Gregg acknowledged that many Nobles have helped when asked during these years, however, his ever-present sidekick, Illustrious Sir Jack Hansen has served with him in almost every capacity; a well-oiled team.

When asked about what one thing in his 35 years of being a Shriner he is most proud, Gregg immediately points out that although his involvement with Rawsonville Shrine Club, The Hungry Five, The Americans and Chief Aide position continue to be important, it was in the last several years, that his love for our Shriners Hospitals for Children became a significant source of pride. Gregg has volunteered on numerous occasions to drive our patients, and he has made trips to the Shriners Hospitals for Children in Erie, Cincinnati and Chicago. The smile on his face when he talks about driving our children is the same smile many of us have when we see how hard Gregg has worked in his service to our Fraternity.

Nobles, Gregg works behind the scene, never wanting or searching for accolades. He has served our fraternity and philanthropy since his fez was placed on his head, with great joy and enthusiasm. I ask each and every one of you to thank him and be present at our Spring Ceremonial to honor this Noble.



This Article Deals with Dues & Their Break Down Per the Bylaws

332.4 Hospital Permanent Contributing Membership

- (a) Amount. A member may purchase for \$150 a Permanent Contributing Membership in the Hospitals, receive a certificate therefor from the Recorder of the temple and be exempt from any further hospital levy.
- (b) Exemption. Th temple Recorder shall enter on this record the exemption form future hospital levy of all members holding a fully paid Permanent Contributing Membership certificate.
- (c) Remission. The temple Recorder shall promptly remit all sums received by him for permanent contributing memberships to the Imperial Treasurer for deposit to the account of the Hospitals.

332.5 Hospital Voluntary Permanent Subscription.

- (a) Certificate. Shriners International may issue a Voluntary Permanent Subscription Certificate to any person or organization for not less than \$60.
- (b) Conversion. A member holding a Voluntary Permanent Subscription Certificate in his name, even though issued before he became an active member, may convert it to a Permanent Contributing Membership certificate by surrendering his certificate and pay the difference between the amount paid for his Voluntary Permanent Subscription and the of Permanent Contributing Membership. Thereafter he is exempt from any hospital levy.
- (c) Remission. The temple Recorder shall promptly remit all sums received by him for voluntary permanent subscriptions to the Imperial Treasurer for deposit to the account of the Hospitals.

332.6 Dues. Life Memberships in Temple.

- (a) Life. A temple may create life members, who will thereafter be exempt from the temple's annual dues:
- (1) Meritorious service. For meritorious service.
- (2) Longevity. When a member has paid his dues for a term of not less than 35 years.
- (3) Prepayment of Dues.
- (i) When a member who is under 65 years of age pays the temple, in one lump sum, not less than 20 times the temple's current annual dues or such other age or amount as its temple bylaws; or
- (ii) When a member who is 65 years of age or older pays the temple, in one lump sum, not less than 10 times the temple's current annual dues, or such other age or amount as its temple bylaws state, but not less than age 60
- (4) Fund. All money received from life membership shall be placed in a perpetual fund. Only the income from the fund may be withdrawn and used for the operating of the temple. However, if the temple bylaws so provide, upon the death of a life member, an amount equal to the sum paid by him may be transferred to the operating fund of the temple. The amount of the fund shall be reported annually on the temple's statement of financial position. For investment purposes, the money in the fund may be placed in a common fund other temple moneys.

Your Smiling Face

If you're smiling, chances are there is a Lady Clown in your midst. As one of the more active units, the LOS Lady Clown Unit entertains folks during the annual Shrine Circus events and a number of others throughout the year. They regularly appear at events like the Shrine Kids Christmas Party, Shrine Family Picnic and Ladies Oriental Shrine functions such as the Great Lakes Unit Meet. The ladies have also been invited to March of Dimes events, church functions & school performances. Several of the Lady Clowns have entertained in the America's Thanksgiving Day Parade, Ford's Hob Nobble Gobble and Fantasy Flight. Fantasy Flights are operated by Silverliners, a group of retired flight attendants and Delta Airlines, and are for very sick or terminally ill children and their families. They fly to a fictitious place by taxiing down the runway and arriving at the final destination (end of runway or hotel), which is typically the North Pole. Many people, including firemen and police officers come together to make this event special. The Moslem Shrine Clowns have been doing this event for over 35 years.

These talented and warm-hearted ladies have been playing an important role as counterparts to the Shrine Clown Unit since 1966. The Lady Clown unit currently has 15 clowns with 3 more ladies likely to join. Says unit leader Carol "Puddles" Roy, "Our clowns represent a wide range of ages. We even have Welda 'Lil' Pic'n' Felber who is 102 years old. She's not performing as much but she is still one of ours." And like the Shriners, the honor of participating in LOS and more particularly in the Lady Clown Unit flows from generation to generation. Dr. Jane "Doc" Crawford, the assistant leader, has had the pleasure of clowning around for the last 3 years with her daughter Karley "Pebbles" Weiler. Jane has been a Lady Clown for 5 years and when asked what got her interested in clowning, she said, "I've always admired the clowns, always wanted to be a clown. My dad was a Shriner and he was good friends with Bob Haffner. We were always around clowns and the circus."





These Women Take "Fun" Seriously

The unit's monthly meetings focus on how to improve their characters aesthetically and functionally. They are aware of the part they play in introducing children (and adults!) to the whimsy and fantasy of the circus. As "lady" clowns, they have a softer "mom" persona that resonates with young children. Their colorful hair, sparkly eyes and swishy frocks help cover the bases when entertaining alongside the Shrine Clown unit.

In the interest of bringing even more smiles to the masses, the Lady Clowns have been stepping up their "Wow" by taking classes. Under the guidance of Noble Rick "Shifty" Gaines, the ladies have begun learning more about balloon twisting, face painting, tattoos and even some magic. Noble Gaines will be holding classes this April for both the Lady Clown and Shrine Clown units to continue their performance education. They'll learn more about prop handling, makeup application and entertainment strategies. These clowns are rarin' to go!

Dr. Jane who is a pharmacist by day (hence the name "Doc) says, "As a clown, you morph into your 'look'. I initially started with one concept and soon found myself with my current look because it just worked. I get great feedback from the kids and that is what is important to me."

"I like to twist balloons and have my picture taken with all the children and their families when at the Circus. I especially love the smiles Twinkles puts on all the faces of the people 'she' meets – young and old and alike." Sue is looking forward to being installed as *High Priestess of Za-hir-u-din Court #7* this April.
